Schools Looks for New Superintendent

Portland Public Schools Superintendent Benjamin O. Canada, Ph.D., and the Portland Public Schools Board of Education have agreed to end their employment relationship effective June 30, the Board announced Friday.

Jim Scherzinger, chief financial officer for the district and a former director of the Oregon Legislative Revenue Office, will serve as interim superintendent until the search for new leadership is completed.

The board will appoint a Leadership Advisory Committee, charged with recommending applicant qualifications and selection criteria. The board will then seek comment through community meetings, personal interviews and other opportunities for public response.

The timeline for completing the initial stage of the search process will be announced next month. Once completed, the board will approve a job description, qualifications and selection criteria, and will initiate the search process.

"Dr. Canada has brought many positive changes to Portland over the last three years," said School Board Chair Debbie Menashe. "These include leading the creation of the Strategic Plan for the district, fostering a focus on achievement for principals and teachers in all Portland schools, overseeing improved achievement and rising test scores throughout the district, and putting in place a highly talented manage-

"He has led the district to a new place, with new opportunities - a place that both Ben and the Board agree now requires a different kind of leadership," Menashe

added. "The Board thanks him for his hard work and valuable contributions on behalf of the district and wishes him well. We are particularly grateful for his efforts to build a district-wide financial and information systems infrastructure that will serve us well in the future, and his success in improving our credibility with the Oregon Legislature." Dr. Canada will continue to

serve as superintendent through June 30 and will consult with the board for a period of time to assist in transitional matters and to share his expertise.

Scherzinger will guide the district through the transition.

He will work closely with Deputy Superintendent Pat Burk to continue the district's efforts to reach their educational goals. "The Board is confident that the district is in excellent hands with this team in place,"

Menashe said. "The next step is to begin a search for a new leadership. We need to define what the district needs, and what teachers, parents and community want."

Dr. Canada was hired as superintendent on Aug. 3, 1998. Prior to coming to Portland, he served as superintendent of the Atlanta School District.

With 31 years of experience in education, he is current president of The American Association of School Administrators.

Heated Exchanges Disrupt School Board

Heated arguments between members of the Portland School Board and Education Crisis Team eventually led to a board member walk out Monday.

The crisis team has been leading a battle to improve the education of minority students in the district.

"They (minorities) have not been given the most rudimentary elements of an education," said Ron Herndon, one of the group's leaders.

"Now if that means we have to go in and protest, we'll do that."

The protest was a direct confrontation with school board chairperson Debbie Goldberg Menashe who pleaded for the protests to end in order to deal with a set agenda that included the honoring of valedictorian students.

The school board says they have implemented many of the changes the Education Crisis Team is calling for. School board members did come back after the interruption to resume discussion on another controversy, the ban against military recruitment within the schools.

A motion was approved that allows teachers to approach students and students can approach teachers about military recruitment, but teachers have to inform students that the military discriminates against gays and lesbians.

Election Names County Chair

Diane Linn has won a special election to become the new chairwoman of the Multnomah County Board of Commis-

Linn succeeds Bev Stein, who stepped down after announcing her intention to run for governor in 2002.

Linn, a former county commissioner, received 54 percent of the votes in the May 15 vote-by-mail election. The margin was more than enough to avoid a runoff. Linn's closest challenger, former state Rep. Jo Ann Bowman, received 25 percent of the vote.

In a second county race, Maria Rojo de Steffey finished with just under 51 percent of the vote for the District 1 seat on the county board. She needed to finish with more than 50 percent to avoid a runoff on July 10.




Neighborhoods Find Appreciation for Clean Rivers
