







Former Boise School Teacher Dies

Lenna Mae Reynolds died April 29, 2001, at age 99. Mrs. Reynolds was born Lenna Mae Harvey on July 6, 1901, in Brookings, S.D. She graduated from New Mexico Highlands University in Las Vegas, N.M., and moved in the 1920s to Portland. She was an elementary school teacher in Portland Public Schools for 23 years, retiring in 1969 from Boise Elementary School.

Survivors include her daughter, Jeannie C. Briggs; son, Jay M. Dickenson; five grandchildren, 18 great-grandchildren, and 11 greatgreat-grandchildren.

'Wander'ring Minstrel' Remembered

A memorial service was held May 11, 2001, in First Congregational Church in Vancouver, Wash., for Wilton Julius "Bill" Slocum, who died May 6 at age 84. Mr. Slocum was born March 12, 1917, in Mobridge S.D. He graduated from Dakota Wesleyan University. During World War II, he served in the Army in the South Pacific and earned a Purple Heart. He moved to Vancouver in 1948.

He was a tenor in operas, light operas and solo performances, was featured as the "Wand'ring Minstrel" on KPOJ Radio in the 1950s. He also was a private voice coach and taught music at Lieser Elementary, Lewis Junior High School, Fort Vancouver High School and at David Douglas High School in Portland until retiring in 1975. He founded and led several choral groups, including the Brahms Singers. In 1941, he married Irma Hershey. Survivors include his wife; sons, David and John; daughters, Julie Robinson, Becky Andrews and Beth Nye; 16 grandchildren; and two great-
