one of the standard Serif or Sand Serif fonts. Use a good sized font, too, such as 11 or 12 point; anything smaller won't scan well. Lightweight white paper is ideal for scannable resumes, and if it's longer than a page, use a paper clip instead of staples." - Jake Jamieson of wetfeet.com.

If you don't know HTML, which is easy to learn, programs like FrontPage cost about\$100 and will help you format and post your page." – Jake Jamieson of wetfeet.com.
