## **Community Activist and Entrepreneur Dies at 84**

STORY CONTINUED FROM FRONT METRO infamous Romeo and Juliet.

Maxey and Johnnie moved to Portland in 1942 where they raised their family.

Through their combined entrepreneurial spirit, the couple owned and operated Maxey's Barbershop, a dry cleaner, an appliance store, Maxey's Better Buy Grocery Store, and served as Oregon Liquor Commission Agents until their retirement in 1985. Maxey came to Oregon with an attitude of an activist. His motto was, "If there's something to fight about, I'm ready!" Conversations at his barbershop and grocery store ranged from politics to social justice to discrimination; he kept a con-

stant pulse on what was happening in the community.

axey received numer VIous honors and awards including the Freedom Award Citation by the NAACP, the Emerald Award for Lifetime Achievement by Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., the Entrepreneur Award by the State of Oregon, Certificate of Recognition by Benson High School, the Real Father of the Community Award by the Barbershop Connection and the Distinguished Citizen Award by Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

Survivors include his wife; five children; a brother and two sisters; seven grandchildren and a great-grandson.

### Stanley Pietka


Stanley Pietkadied July 20, 2001 atage 93. Mr. Pietka was born Sept. 23,1907 in Boleslawiec, Poland. He immigrated to Portland about 1910 and graduated from Benson Polytechnic High School. During World War II, he served in the U.S. Navy in the South Pacific. He was a heavy

machine engineer for several logging companies before retiring in 1968. In the late 1940s, he married Lucilla; she died two years later. The Tri-County Metropolitan District of Oregon (Tri-Met) is offering the public an opportunity to comment on its plan for FY 2002 federal transit funding. Tri-Met will hold a public hearing on Mon., Sept. 10, 2001 at 2 pm in Conf. Rm. A at 4012 SE 17th Ave, Portland OR 97214. The purpose of the hearing will be to discuss capital projects for which Tri-Met plans to seek FY 2002 funding from the Federal Transit Administration.

In FY 2002, Tri-Met estimates that it will be eligible for the following programs: Section 5307 Surface Transportation Program (STP) \$13,439,695

Section 5307 Congestion, Mitigation & Air Quality (CMAQ) \$6,524,190 Section 5309 Fixed Guideway Modernization (Rail Mod) \$4,200,000

Section 5309 New Starts The proposed Program of Projects is: \$114,500,685 - \$118,663,885

This table shows the plan for the maximum expected amount. If less funding is available, the federal involvement in these projects will be reduced.

1) Transit Tracker: "real time" displays showing when the next bus or train will arrive at about 40 bus shelter and rail platforms.

2) Bus Preventive Maintenance: partial funding of Tri-Met's bus maintenance costs for FY 2002.

3) Rail Preventive Maintenance: partial funding of Tri-Met's rail maintenance costs for FY 2002.

4) Bus purchase: approximately 13 replacement buses. 5) Transportation Demand Management (TDM): designed to reduce air pollution by providing such

services as carpool matching, vanpool subsides and outreach to employers. 6) Region 2040 Initiatives/TMA: Tri-Met administers these funds and contact with groups such as transportation management associations to expand the core TDM program to focus on area of regional significance (such as regional centers, industrial areas and the central city) in the Region

7) Interstate MAX Project: Funding to support the next phases of construction of the Interstate MAX

light rail extension. All projects have been selected through Tri-Met's planning process, which incorporates public involvement, and are included in the Metropolitan and State Transportation Improvement Programs. These projects conform to comprehensive land use and transportation planning in the area. No persons, families, or businesses will be displayed by the projects.


