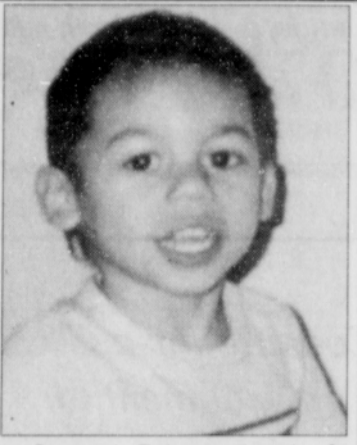


## Awaiting Adoption

## Aaliyah Remembered as Rising Superstar

Kelly produced Aaliyah's debut album, "Age Ain't Nothing But A Number," which spawned hit singles like "Back & Forth" and "At Your Best (You Are Love)."

Her midriff-baring clothes and her suggestive lyrics (the album's title track spoke of going "all the way" with an older man) raised some eyebrows.

She didn't understand the fuss. "I didn't feel I was too mature," the singer said. "I felt for my age, I was just right," she said. "Yeah, it was a bit sexy, but that was just me,

and I'm not going to deny being a little bit sexy, I think it's a wonderful thing."

Her artistic pairing with Kelly allegedly turned romantic when the singer was just a teen; documents showed that the pair got married, but it was apparently without her parent's consent and was later annulled. The pair severed their artistic ties and refused to comment about their relationship.

Aaliyah's next disc, "One in a Million," did even better as she began a partnership with producer/rappers Missy "Misdemeanor" Elliott and Timbaland. Among the

hits off of that album included the title track and "If Your Girl Only Knew."

Her latest record, the self-titled "Aaliyah," debuted at No. 2 on Billboard's Top 200 albums chart when it was released last month.

The album had darker themes than her previous work; one of the songs on the disc included a tune about domestic violence.

"I got a chance to really grow into myself as a young adult, and I think you hear that on the album," Aaliyah said. "From the subject matter to the songs and the feel of it, even vocally, the whole nine

yards, the album is very much Aaliyah, a young adult."

In 1999, she was nominated for a Grammy award for best female R&B performance for "Are You That Somebody"; she was nominated once again this year for "Try Again," the song from "Romeo Must Die," her first shot at the movies.

The action film also starred Jet Li and was a surprise hit at the box office, making her a much sought-after actress in Hollywood. She won a starring role in the film adaptation of Anne Rice's "Queen of the Damned," and also landed coveted roles in sequels to "The Matrix."

## People Rally Against Displacement

Concerned citizens, community leaders, clergy and government officials will rally against involuntary displacement of tenants and homeowners in north and northeast Portland on Monday, Sept. 10, at 4 p.m. in front of Reflections Coffee and Book Store, 446 N.E. Killingsworth St.

The rally is intended to raise public awareness of the problem of displacement, allow public testimony by people affected by displacement and to invite local residents to complete a survey on housing security.

A Housing Resource Fair, in conjunction with the rally, will offer information and resources on how to prevent displacement and buying a home.

Displacement occurs when people are forced to move out or away from their neighborhoods because of the rising cost of housing. It commonly forces the poor, working class residents, most often people of color, immigrants and elderly to move out of their homes, while wealthier, often white, residents move in.

Forced displacement has historically been known to cause a cultural and economic shift of a neighborhood.

In response to this critical issue, door-to-door interviews and surveys are being conducted to gather information on just how deeply displacements have or will affect north and northeast neighborhoods.

The Alliance to End Displacement, the rally organizer, is comprised of individuals and organizations who act as allies for low-income residents and residents of color living in Interstate neighborhoods. Rally organizers will encourage and empower others to respond proactively in demanding accountability and solutions to preventing forced housing displacement and preserving affordable housing.

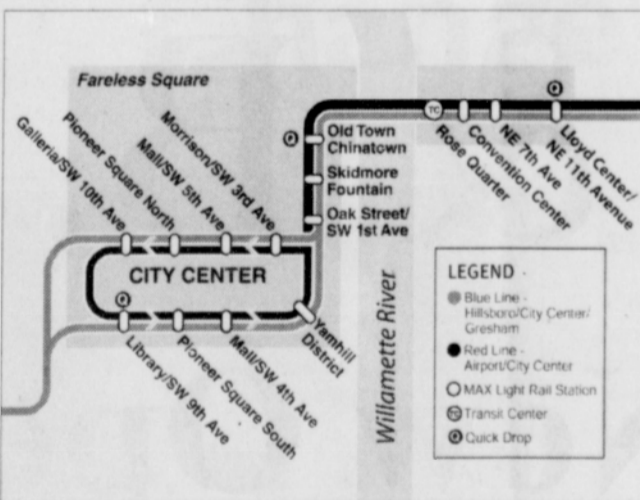
### NEW AIRPORT SERVICE

As of September 10 at noon, MAX Red Line is bound for Portland International Airport. MAX trains to the airport will run every 15 minutes from downtown, 5 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. daily.

### BETTER TIMES

New bus schedules take effect Sunday, September 9, and are available at Tri-Met's Customer Information Office downtown in Pioneer Courthouse Square, Fred Meyer, Safeway, and most Albertson's stores. Or visit [www.tri-met.org](http://www.tri-met.org)

You'll see changes in bus service in the Northeast Portland, Gresham, Troutdale, Wood Village, Fairview, Parkrose, and Gateway areas. MAX trains will also run more frequently between downtown and Gateway.

Fareless Square is now bigger than ever, extending across the Willamette River to the Lloyd District. That means you can ride all over downtown and now to Lloyd Center, free!

### MORE SIGNS AND SHELTERS

You'll see Transit Tracker electronic signs installed at several MAX stations and bus stops to tell you when the next MAX train or bus is scheduled to arrive. There will be 100 new bus shelters along bus routes. New bus stop signs will make finding your bus easy—just look for the familiar Tri-Met stripes.

### SMALL CHANGE

Most cash fares are up only a nickel. Honored Citizen, All-Day Ticket, and Adventure Pass prices remain the same. The new 6-hour Quik Tik is now available for \$3.
