II. SUMMONS

YOU ARE SUMMONED AND REQUIRED TO APPEAR at the hearing on the date, time and place indicated. The purpose of the hearing is to hear and consider evidence on the petition. You Have The Right to be represented by an attorney at any hearings on the petition regarding the above-named child, to introduce evidence, to be heard on your own behalf, to examine witnesses, to receive a decision based solely on the evidence adduced at the hearing, and to an unbiased fact-finder.

YOU HAVE THE RIGHT, if you are indigent and cannot afford an attorney, to have an attorney appointed for you by the court. In order to apply for a court-appointed attorney, contact Lewis County Juvenile Court by telephone at (360) 740-1178 or in person at the Lewis County Juvenile Courthouse at 1255 S.W. Pacific Avenue, Chehalis, Washington, 98532. An attorney can look at the social and legal files in this case, talk to the social worker, tell you about the law, help you understand your rights, and help you at trial.

YOU MAY BE responsible for the financial support of the above-named child if the child is placed in out-of-home care.

YOU SHOULD BE PRESENT AT THIS HEARING. If you do not come, the judge will not hear what you have to say. If you desire additional information about your child, you should contact the Department of Social and Health Services at (360) 807-7081.

The White House, the Pentagon and the Capitol were evacuated along with other federal buildings in Washington and New York.

Authorities in Washington immediately called out troops, including an infantry regiment. The Situation Room at the White House was in full operation. Authorities went on alert from coast to coast, the U.S. and Canadian borders were sealed, all air traffic across the country was halted, and security was tightened at strategic installations.

"This is the second Pearl Harbor. I don't think that I overstate it," said Sen. Chuck Hagel, R-Neb. The Dec. 7, 1941, Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor killed nearly 2,400 people and drew the United States into World War II.

In June, a U.S. judge had set this Wednesday as the sentencing date for a bin Laden associate for his role in the 1998 bombing of a U.S. embassy in Tanzania that killed 213 people. The sentencing had been set for the federal courthouse near the World Trade Center. No one from the U.S. attorney's office could be reached Tuesday to comment on whether the sentencing was still on.

Afghanistan's hardline Taliban rulers condemned the attacks and rejected suggestions that bin Laden was behind them, saying he does not have the means to carry out such well-orchestrated attacks. Bin Laden has been given asylum in Afghanistan.

Abdel-Bari Atwan, editor of the Al-Quds al-Arabi newspaper, said he received a warning from Islamic fundamentalists close to bin Laden, but did not take the threat seriously. "They said it would be a huge and unprecedented attack but they did not specify," Atwan said in a telephone interview in London.

In the West Bank city of Nablus, thousands of Palestinians celebrated the attacks, chanting "God is Great" and handing out candy.

American Airlines initially identified the planes that crashed into the Trade Center as Flight 11, a Los Angeles-bound jet hijacked after takeoff from Boston with 92 people aboard, and Flight 77, which was seized while carrying 64 people from Washington to Los Angeles.

Law enforcement officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said it was Flight 77 that hit the Pentagon.

In Pennsylvania, United Airlines Flight 93, a Boeing 757 en route from Newark, N.J., to San Francisco, crashed about 80 miles southeast of Pittsburgh with 45 people aboard. United said another of its planes, Flight 175, a Boeing 767 bound from Boston to Los Angeles with 65 people on board, also crashed, but it did not say where. The fate of those aboard the two planes was not immediately known.

United's pilots union said United Flight 175 crashed into the Trade Center. But the airline had no immediate comment.

An emergency dispatcher in Westmoreland County, Pa., received a cell phone call at 9:58 a.m. from a man who said he was a passenger locked in the bathroom of United Flight 93, said dispatch supervisor Glenn Cramer.

"We are being hijacked, we are being hijacked!" Cramer quoted the man as saying. The man told dispatchers the plane "was going down. He heard some sort of explosion and saw white smoke coming from the plane and we lost contact with him," Cramer said.

Evacuations were ordered at the United Nations in New York and at the Sears Tower in Chicago. Los Angeles mobilized its

anti-terrorism division, and security was intensified around the naval installations in Hampton Roads, Va. Walt Disney World in Orlando, Fla., was evacuated.

In New York, hours after the attacks, huge clouds of smoke billowed from the ruins, obscuring much of the skyline.

The two planes blasted fiery, gaping holes in the upper floors of one of New York's most famous landmarks and rained debris on the streets. About an hour later, the southern tower collapsed with a roar and a huge cloud of smoke; the other tower fell about a half-hour after that, covering lower Manhattan in heaps of gray rubble and broken glass. Firefighters trapped in the rubble radioed for help.

"All this stuff started falling and all this smoke was coming through. People were screaming, falling, and jumping out of the windows," from high in the sky, said Jennifer Brickhouse, 34, of Union, N.J., who was going up the escalator into the World Trade Center.

On the street, a crowd mobbed a man at a pay phone, screaming at him to get off the phone so that they could call relatives. Dust and dirt flew everywhere. Ash was 2 to 3 inches deep in places. People wandered dazed and terrified.

"I have a sense it's a horrendous number of lives lost," Mayor Rudolph Giuliani said. "Right now we have to focus on saving as many lives as possible."

The death toll on the crashed planes alone could surpass that of the Oklahoma City bombing on April 19, 1995, which claimed 168 lives in what was the deadliest act of terrorism on U.S. soil.

"Today we've had a national tragedy," Bush said in Sarasota, Fla. "Two airplanes have crashed into the World Trade Center in an apparent terrorist attack on our country." He said he would be returning immediately to Wash-

ington.

John Axisa, who was getting off a commuter train to the World Trade Center, said he saw "bodies falling out" of the building. He said he ran outside, and watched people jump out of the first building. Then there was a second explosion, and he felt heat on the back of neck.

People ran down the stairs in panic and fled the building. Thousands of pieces of what appeared to be office paper drifted over Brooklyn, about three miles away.

Several subway lines were immediately shut down. Trading on Wall Street was suspended. New York's mayoral primary election Tuesday was postponed. All bridges and tunnels into Manhattan were closed.

David Reck was handing out literature for a candidate for public advocate a few blocks away when he saw a jet come in "very low, and then it made a slight twist and dove into the building."

Terrorist bombers struck the World Trade Center in February 1993, killing six people and injuring more than 1,000 others.

"It's just sick. It just shows how vulnerable we really are," Keith Meyers, 39, said in Columbus, Ohio. "It kind of makes you want to go home and spend time with your family. It puts everything in perspective," Meyers said. He said he called to check in with his wife. They have two young children.

In 1945, an Army Air Corps B-25, a twin-engine bomber, crashed into the 79th floor of the Empire State Building in dense fog.

In Florida, Bush was reading to children in a classroom at 9:05 a.m. when his chief of staff, Andrew Card, whispered into his ear. The president briefly turned somber before he resumed reading. He addressed the tragedy about a half-hour later.

seriously investigated," Wilson said.

Fizer, a Mississippi native and Oregon State University graduate, was hired in 1999.

By June, he developed ulcers, stopped coming to work and used up his sick and vacation time. On June 19 he filed for a stress-related disability claim. Fizer was the only African American firefighter at the station and had a clean record.

When Fizer raised the allegations to some supervisors, they said practical jokes were part of the fire bureau's culture and were not meant to be malicious.

Fizer said that 90 percent of the firefighters in the bureau are "standup guys," but his station was known for an anything-goes

atmosphere that helped foster the racial incidents.

"For a job I absolutely loved and worked so hard to get, it was more of a slap in the face to have nothing done," he said. "I love this job, but I don't love it so much that I'm going to forsake who I am. There's a problem within the bureau, and they haven't handled it right."

Within the 720-member bureau, there are 26 blacks, 23 Hispanics, 21 Asians, nine American Indians and 30 women.

Fizer joined the Portland Fire Bureau through its apprenticeship program. The bureau continues to run the program, a six-month school that prepares candidates to become probationary firefighters. Most who participate are women and minorities.

Security tightened across Oregon after terror attacks

all other military installations in the state, said Lt. Misti Oiler, public affairs officer.

Kitzhaber met with the Oregon State Police and the National Guard Tuesday morning.

"This calls for all of us, everyone in the nation, to reach inside ourselves and find the courage to not allow these kinds of things to disrupt our lives," Kitzhaber said. "We need to carry on."

The U.S. Forest Service locked down its Northwest regional headquarters in Portland, but later Tuesday morning decided to send employees home, said spokesman Rex Holloway.

"Even though nothing, to our knowledge, has happened in the Portland area, still there is that level of concern," Holloway said. "Quite frankly, this is incredibly distracting and employees are very concerned and it is very hard

to concentrate right now. I think people's minds are just really elsewhere."

At the Portland airport, 305 flights were grounded and about 25,000 passengers had to change their plans because all departures were suspended.

Sixty-year-old traveler Janice Wilson had just heard about the blasts at the World Trade Center in New York and at the Pentagon.

"This is something we in the U.S. have never experienced and you don't know where it is going to strike next. It makes me sick to my stomach," she said.

Flights were also canceled at airports in Coos Bay, Redmond, Salem, Eugene and Medford.

Federal courthouses and building across Oregon were closed.

The Portland headquarters for the Bonneville Power Administration, the federal power agency, was also closed, said Ian

Templeton, a BPA spokesman.

"On the whole, we have a heightened security ... we're not going to let anyone else in today," he said.

Classes at several private schools in Portland and Vancouver, Wash., were canceled. At least two malls in the Portland area were closed.

Sen. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., was about to give a speech away from Capitol Hill at the time of the attack, according to his chief of staff Josh Kardon. "We were advised by the Capitol police to not bring Senator Wyden back to the Capitol but to get him to a secure place," Kardon said.

Sen. Gordon Smith, R-Ore., monitored developments from an aide's home after he was evacuated from the Capitol, said Kerry Tymchuk, director of Smith's Portland office.

"He is a member of the Foreign Affairs Committee. I imagine this

will dominate all of government for the next several weeks, if not longer," Tymchuk said. Other members of Oregon's Congressional delegation were safe at aides homes in the nation's Capital.

Twelve-year-old Nicole Kordenat, a girl scout from Woodburn, Ore., was visiting the Capitol on her first trip to Washington when her tour group was evacuated.

"I felt, 'What's next, the Capitol?' My stomach started hurting. It was scary. I'll remember this my whole life."

In Portland, an emergency operations center was set up to deal with possible threats to the area, although none had been reported.

"These incidents have ripple effects — we know that," said Police Chief Mark Kroeker. He urged residents not to use cell phones and limit emergency and long distance calls to reduce the strain on phone lines.

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
