
Local favorite Curtis Salgado will be performing during the

The Violent Rise and Fall of Death Row Records



In 1993, Death Row
Records exploded onto the
music scene with their
"Gangsta Rap." The label
made superstars out of Dr.
Dre, Tupac Shakur and
Snoop Doggy Dogg —
releasing an unprecedented
six consecutive multiplatinum albums.

A controversial film, "Welcome to Death Row" documenting the dizzying rise and equally dramatic fall of Death Row Records, the label which effectively launched the "gangsta rap" music genre, is now available in video stores nationwide.

The feature length documentary by Xenon Pictures takes an unblinking look at Death Row Records, the label that captured the anger and energy of rap so effectively in the mid-1990s that its first six CD releases went double platinum. That extraordinary success unraveled with allegations that the label had been founded with drug money (triggering an FBI investigation); the murder of its biggest star, Tupac Shakur; and revelations of aggressive and sometimes violent business practices.

The CEO of Death Row Records, a 315 pound ex-body-guard named Mairon "Suge" Knight, was released from an Oregon federal prison on Aug. 7 after serving 5 years for probation following a series of assault convictions.
