Tentative contract agreement reached with city workers

(AP) — A tentative contract agreement was reached early Monday between the city and about 1,800 union employees who walked off the job for about 45 minutes in the early morning.

"Idon'tknow if we're vying for the Guinness Book of Records' shortest strike in history," said Yvonne Martinez, a spokeswoman for the District Council of Trade Unions.

Details of the agreement are still in flux, she said. Both sides, however, agreed to create a joint committee to review health care changes, a main sticking point in the negotiations.

Worksite meetings would be held in coming days and results of a ratification vote would be known in about three weeks, Martinez

Deckard, Portland's director of human services, said she asked for a "timeout" to avoid working on delicate contract language late at night. Deckard said she offered to resume talks Saturday, but the union declined.

"We want to get a deal that we think is fair to our employees," she said. "But we also want a deal that is not on the backs of the taxpayers."

A strike likely would have taken parking-meter attendants off the streets and affected the city's ability to clean backed-up sewers or pick up leaves.

The threat of a strike led Portland police to issue an order to limit arrests and bookings of nonviolent suspects at the county jail, in case fingerprint technicians walked off their jobs. Local police precincts also would have shut down, but patrol officers and 911 operators would have continued

Gresham Police Chief Seeks Sheriff

Facing increased healthcare costs and a shrinking general fund budget, the city wanted trade union workers to begin paying a portion of their health care premiums. The costs would be up to \$600 a year for family coverage.

The city also wanted a 25 percent cut in costs for its most popular health plan, on top of an 8 percent cut implemented July 1. That could mean workers would face deductibles for the first time, perhaps \$250 a year, and many would pay 20 percent of medical costs instead of 10 percent.

After decades of top-notch benefits, the changes are too much to take, union leaders said.

"When I came to work for the city, they promised me they'd take care of me, and now they've dropped that ball," said city employee John Wilson.

Food Stamp Users Increase as Oregon Economy Declines

(AP) - The number of Oregonians on food stamps jumped more than 77,000 in September compared with September of last year another sign that the state economy is in rough shape.

The 32 percent increase pushed the number of Oregon food stamp users to 315,691, roughly 9 percent of the population.

State economist Tom

Potiowsky said there's no question the rise is related to Oregon's unemployment rate, now at 6.4 percent. Many of the recipients likely are minimum-wage workers, who are often the first to lose their jobs in a recession and who don't have savings to tide them over, he said.

Jim Neely, state food stamp coordinator, said it was the biggest year-to-year increase he has seen since 1974, when he started working in the assistance program.

People out of work or whose hours have been cut account for much of the increase, he said. But the food stamp program has also streamlined the application process and is reaching more Oregonians eligible for help, Neely said.

Oregon to Become Breeding Site for Condors

Biologists are hoping to breed endangered condors at Portland's Oregon Zoo.

The zoo will be the fourth breeding site for the California condor, a bird with a 9-foot wingspan that once lived in the Pacific Northwest but nearly vanished from the Earth 20 years ago.

Federal biologists considered proposals from zoos in San Francisco and Oklahoma but chose the Oregon Zoo because of its dedication to wildlife conservation.

"What the Oregon Zoo did right is they really found out the details first," said Bruce Palmer, condor recovery coordinator for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. "They visited the existing condor facilities and asked themselves the hard questions about what it would take to do it and how committed they were."

About 100 captive condors live in breeding centers in Los Angeles, San Diego and Boise, Idaho. Adding the Oregon Zoo to the list will boost the captive population and will produce more condor chicks for release into the wild, Palmer said.

Depending on how soon the zoo builds structures such as vast flight pens, young condors that have not reached breeding age may arrive in Portland next summer. Three or four breeding pairs of condors would then follow and could produce eggs the following year, Palmersaid.

Blair Csuti, the Oregon Zoo's

conservation program director, said the zoo will house up to 16 condors. Officials immediately will begin raising funds for the construction, which they expect will boost the zoo's national role in wildlife conservation.

"We might be able to build the flight pen for next year for a halfmillion dollars, but we'd need about \$2 million to \$3 million for a complete facility," he said.

California condors were once common in Oregon. They were mentioned in the journals of the Lewis and Clark expedition 200 years ago. But settlers hunted and poisoned them to near extinction. The Oregon Zoo's success in other animal-conservation efforts helped it get the condor project.
