Commission Looks to Restrict Minor Entertainers in Bars

The Oregon Liquor Control Commission is working on tightening the state's minor entertainer rules to keep underage performers safe and out of drinking areas when not on stage.

The rules affect underage musicians, comedians, nude dancers and other entertainers who work in nightclubs, bars and taverns, in areas where minors are otherwise prohibited. State law and OLCC rules allow minor performers, repair people such as plumbers, and others into the drinking environment, but only as long as needed to perform essential duties.

In recent years, though, some entertainment practices have changed, bringing underage performers in closer contact with adult patrons in prohibited drinking areas. An OLCC advisory committee met recently to look into these practices – and many members suggested restricting this mingling with customers when not performing.

Many committee members suggested getting rid of a rule exception: allowing performers to go to a minor "table" in the bar after their performance instead of to a more secluded dressing room. The underage table is supervised and no alcohol is allowed, but committee members agreed it doesn't keep minors out of the drinking environment.

The commission meets Dec. 3-4.

The group introduces non-traditional construction trades as an option for middle- and high school-aged girls, using tradeswomen as role models. The 11 year-old organization is dedicated to promoting the success of women in the trades.

PGE Customers Buy Record Number of Energy Saving Light Bulbs

Portland General Electric (PGE) announced a major milestone in its campaign to place energy-saving light bulbs in every home is serves. PGE customers have purchased more than 750,000 compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) with the company's \$6 discount coupons.

Customers who used the cou-

pons could save an estimated \$4 million per year on their combined electric bills, compared to the cost of using conventional light bulbs. Redeeming the coupons reduced the purchase price of the bulbs by an additional \$4.5 million.


This month, PGE will mail \$27 worth of CFL coupons to residen-

tial customers: a \$15 torchiere lamp coupon, plus two \$6 coupons good toward the purchase of any Energy Star label CFL of 13 watts or higher. Additional \$6 coupons will arrive in Nov. and Dec. PGE residential bills.

CFLs typically use 70 to 75 percent less power than conventional bulbs, and can last 10 times

longer, based on manufacturer's data.
