**Judge Suspended for Drunk Driving**

(AP) - The Oregon Supreme Court on Thursday suspended for 30 days without pay a veteran Marion County judge because of a drunken driving arrest two years ago.

The state Commission on Judicial Fitness had recommended a one-month suspension or censure of Circuit Judge Albin Norblad.

He was arrested on Jan. 27, 2000, by state police after motorists reported he was driving erratically on Interstate 5 near Salem.

His blood-alcohol test registered .20, more than twice Oregon's legal limit of .08.

Norblad admitted he was intoxicated. A drunken driving charge was dropped after he completed a diversion program including counseling, common procedure for first-time offenders.

The commission said it had no evidence Norblad ever was drunk on the bench or otherwise while at work. He has been a judge since 1973.

Circuit judges are paid \$7,533 a month.

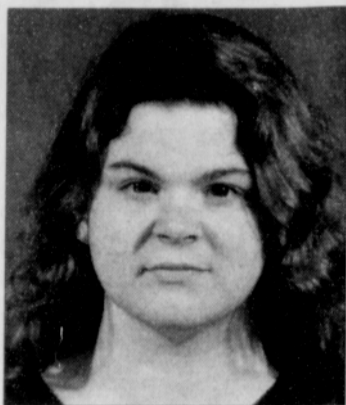
The court said it shared the commission's concern about a "repetition of the misconduct."

**SERT Team Disciplined**

(AP) - Twenty members of the Portland Police Bureau's Special Emergency Reaction Team will be disciplined for making inappropriate sexual jokes during a hazing ritual.

Portland Police Chief Mark Kroeker says ten officers, six sergeants, two lieutenants and two captains will receive letters of reprimand or suspension.

The probe of the city's SERT team began after the only female member resigned in January 2001.

Kroeker would not give a full description of the "inappropriate behavior" that prompted the investigation.

Kroeker says the group engaged in initiation rights to promote cohesiveness. He confirmed that one initiation right involved forcing new members to carry a purse.

Kroeker says some skits performed after hours included humorous sexual themes that were not appropriate.

**Airport Security Boost Advised**

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - The Port of Portland will more than double the policeman guarding its airport to about 90 to make up for increased security demands that arose after Sept. 11, said Executive Director Bill Wyatt last Thursday.

Wyatt spoke at a news conference at which the findings of a security task force were released. The report concluded that the airport is safe but can be made safer and made several recommendations.

Wyatt said the increased security was decided on based on federal staffing regulations and not because of the recommendations by the six-member task force, which included himself.

Recommendations, some of which could take years to implement, included offsite baggage inspection in downtown Portland or along the MAX light rail link to the airport and, for passenger convenience, the possible issuance of a "trusted passenger" card for frequent flyers who would undergo a one-time background

check and use the card to avoid delays in checking in.

Former Gov. Neil Goldschmidt, who was chairman of the task force, said programs such as drug interdiction at the airport would not be abandoned because of increased security demands elsewhere.

"We are not going to back up an inch," he said. He said the port has had excellent cooperation from Portland Police and other agencies but that the time is coming "when we will have to replace those individuals with our own."

Goldschmidt said a goal is to increase security and not jeopardize passenger convenience. "We think we can have both," he said.

The basic goal, he said, "is to keep people with bad intentions away from airplanes and airports."

"The traveling public ultimately will pay for the bulk of any changes that occur," he said.

Wyatt said a ticket surcharge would help but would not cover all the costs.

They estimated the cost of the

security would approximately double, to about \$5 million, but Goldschmidt said overtime since Sept. 11 already has boosted annual costs well beyond the usual \$2.5 million.

Other recommendations in the report included:

- Increasing MAX ridership to the airport in place of private vehicles.
- Expanding airport perimeter security with expanded patrols and physical barriers.
- Using airport redesign to reduce vendor truck trips into secure areas.
- Screening all carry-on and checked bags with explosives detection systems.
- Creating a new director of airport security systems.

Wyatt said many of the federally mandated steps have been carried out.

"The easy things all have been done," he said, adding that the Port of Portland "is going to be at this thing for some time."

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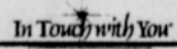
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**WSU Vancouver's Enrollment on the Rise for Undergraduates**

VANCOUVER, Wash. - Spring semester enrollment at Washington State University Vancouver shows continued growth. The number of students on campus has increased 3.9 percent from spring 2001. This semester 1,645 students are enrolled in undergraduate and graduate offerings. Full-time equivalent (FTE) totals also increased over last year to 1,107 — up 7.2 percent (74 FTEs) over spring 2001.

"As enrollment continues to grow it has been very exciting to

see the number of campus and student activities increase," said Nancy Youlden, director of student services. "There has been a strong interest and growth in extracurricular activities including our student government, publications and clubs which are helping to shape student life on campus."

The physical campus continues to grow as well. The Multimedia Classroom building is more than 50 percent completed and will open in January 2003 for spring classes. At 49,000 gross square

feet, the building will be the campus' second largest facility. It will house administrative and faculty offices for the College of Liberal Arts, as well as 12 classrooms and instruction computer laboratories, individual and group study areas and a

two-story student computing laboratory. Plans are also underway for construction of a campus sport court later this year.

WSU Vancouver has seen increasing enrollment since establishment in 1989.

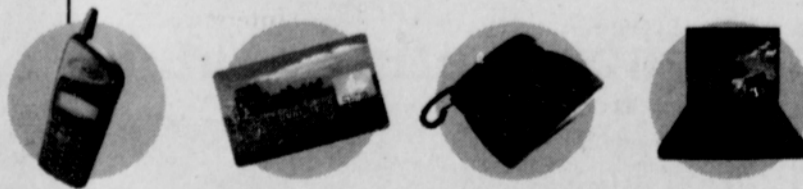


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
