



#### Inmates Released

(AP) - The first wave of inmates were released from the downtown justice center Wednesday as state agencies across Oregon began implementing spending cuts following voters' rejection of a temporary income tax hike.

"It's a party atmosphere at the jail today," lamented Multnomah County Sheriff Bernie Giusto as he announced the release of 31 inmates - among 114 scheduled to be freed by Thursday.

Some of the freed inmates had been in jail pending trial. Others were serving time for crimes ranging from assault to drug manufacturing to sex abuse.

Giusto, the sheriff, said he may be forced to release up to 500 inmates before the end of his budget year in June because of a \$1 million

The inmate release is one of the first cost-saving measures to follow the failure measure 28's proposed tax hike, put on the ballot to stave off \$310 million in spending cuts.
