Flowers was the only African-American student in his chiropractic college and was awarded a prestigious \$10,000 scholarship. He was the student body vice president and has held many administrative positions as a member of the American Black Chiropractic Associations and the Chiropractic Association of Oregon.

"I wanted to help lend visibility and an African American presence so others can say, 'blacks have been here before. This is normal for us," he said.

When Flowers opened his practice, his African-American client base was low and slow coming. "Had it not been for the white

community, I'd be out of busi-

ness," he said.

According to Flowers, it took a bit more time to teach chiropractics to local African Americans. He took a cue from Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and evangelized. He taught seminars at churches and community centers, and took out educational ads in

practic was denied to African Americans for half-of-a-century, Flowers believes that the holistic approach of chiropractic is a natural fit for the black community as African Americans traditionally have trusted time-tested folk medicine and natural home remedies.

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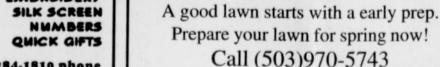
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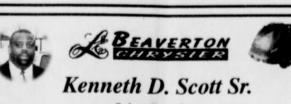
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
