Chris Rock calls his character is the "Rocky" of politics

Funnyman Chris Rock sets his sights on the highest office in the land in the comedy "Head of State," scheduled for release nationwide on Friday, March 28.

In addition to starring, the increasingly multi-faceted Rock makes his directorial debut with "Head of State." He also co-wrote the film with long-time collaborator and "Head of State" producer Ali LeRoi.

Rock stars as Mays Gilliam, a Washington D.C. neighborhood alderman, who's about to be redlined out of his job. But after the untimely death of the party frontrunner, Gilliam is plucked from obscurity and thrust into the limelight as his party's nominee-for President of the United States.

"This film is about the little man running for President. He's the lowest guy you could imagine getting a shot at the biggest title in the world. He's a 'Rocky' of politics," Rock said.

Rock said Gilliam appeals to the public because he has a unique campaign style.



Rounding out the main cast are Dylan Baker ("Road to Perdition") as Gilliam's campaign manager, Nick Searcy ("One Hour Photo") as Mays opponent and James Rebhorn ("Far From Heaven") as the head of the political party.

Another interesting choice Rock made was rapper Nate Dogg, who narrates the movie.

'Nate has long been a narrator of hip-hop culture," Rock said. "By giving him that role, we make the movie relevant to kids and everybody. Nate is great.'
