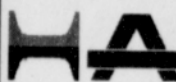

we may not be able to capture later," Cruz said.

Naito and Rojo argued the county should not proceed with the effort at a time when funding for it is not secure and funding for existing programs and facilities is anything but secure. Both noted that funding for the venture doesn't yet exist.

Rojo said a new library would send the wrong message to voters at a time the county is seeking additional taxes.

Most of those testifying favored a new library along Lombard or a more central north Portland location, not at Columbia Villa.

Kent Spring, a high school librarian and member of the Lombard advocates, said the new library should be placed at the spot most accessible to the public being served.

Kathy Crawford of the Arbor Lodge neighborhood said that there was a danger the new Colum-

bia Villa might become "a very well-planned ghetto. If you make it too comfortable for people never to go out of it, you make it more difficult (for residents) to become one of us."

Lisa Horne, director of Peninsula Community Development Corp., testified in favor of the choice.

"Columbia Villa, by its size, location and the perceptions of people outside it, has been kept in isolation. We're working to break down those barriers. Rather than expect that it's the responsibility of a low income community to expand their universe, it's the responsibility of the people in the larger community to become more knowledgeable about what they're talking about," Horne said.

The commission debated as to whether the vote would leave them "locked in" to the Columbia Villa site.

"All we're saying is 'This is the preferred site, let's move forward,'" Linn said.

their children were left without St. Charles Elementary School in 1986 and the historic Kennedy Elementary School in 1975.

"The Kennedy School closed, thank God, because it was going to fall apart," said Frederick, who witnessed firsthand the structural damage to the Kennedy School when he entered the school wearing a hard hat in the 80s

While older schools throughout the city have been maintained, the district gave up on the Kennedy School. Before demolition it was bought by the McMenamins Brothers, who saw

value in the historic site, and turned it into a brew pub.

Debates continue about whether school closures have been colorblind, but none deny that parents in the district have encountered a veritable roller coaster ride while seeking education for their children.

"We have far too many crisis schools, which encourages people to leave the northeast, increasing the imbalance between North and West," said Poe. "We're going to have to clearly, without any reservations, accelerate the achievement of the students in northeast Portland. That's how you will stabilize the area."
