Vandalized Statue a Hate Crime?

As if Joan of Arc, the French child-warrior, didn't suffer enough indignities in her lifetime, pranksters defiled the statue remembering Portland soldiers who fought alongside the French in World War I.

Last week, vandals ripped the laurel wreath from the head and

the statue, standing at Coe Circle at Northeast 39th Avenue and Glisan Street.

Repairing the damage is estimated at \$7,500, half the budget to maintain 1,600 pieces of public art across the county for a year.

The statue was vandalized on Day. The attack was possibly a podumped a can of black paint over litical statement against the French.

Last May, the Regional Arts and Culture Council refurbished the statue by changing the statue's finish from a dull green bronze to a gleaming gold leaf.

FBI Says Man Preyed on Children

(AP)-The FBI has arrested a Tigard man and who traffic in child pornography or prey on charged him with using or trying to use interstate commerce to entice a minor to have sex.

Richard Irvin Detwiler, 61, was arrested near downtown Portland last week. He is the resource development director for the Oregon Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation.

The FBI said the charges are linked to its Innocent Images program that targets people

children online.

The program is in operation in 23 FBI offices around the country. President Bush is seeking more money to expand the program.

The FBI says each year one child in four aged between 10 and 17 is exposed to pornography and that one in five receives sexual solicitation on the Internet.

St. Johns Bridge Named in Threat Report

(AP) - An intelligence report issued by the suspicious incidents at bridges all across the bridges specifically references the St. Johns Bridge in north Portland.

Federal officials acknowledged the reference despite the mention there is no indication that there is any threat to the bridge or the people of Oregon.

The FBI document mentioned a number of

FBI warning of possible threats to the nation's country, including an act of vandalism at the St. Johns Bridge.'

> Road crews found the local bridge had a maintenance room window broken and a padlock tampered with sometime before June 5.

Authorities say there's no indication that the St. Johns Bridge incident was an act of terrorism.

Man Convicted in Outreach Center Fire

A Multnomah County jury convicted 32arson, two counts of burglary, unlawful possession of a destructive substance and criminal mischief.

The charges were related to an incident on year-old Bjarne Alex Lewis of three counts of Sept. 25, in which Lewis sprayed flammable liquid in a room and lit it on fire at the "JOIN" community outreach center at 1136 S.E. Oak. Sentencing is scheduled for Aug. 18.
