
yourself," coach Dave Bliss said Monday. "Were there things that had indicated to us that this situation may have the opportunity to occur?"

The decomposed body of Patrick Dennehy, a 6-foot-10 center, was found last Friday night in a field 3 miles south of town and was identified Sunday.

Carlton Dotson, who played basketball at Baylor last season, was arrested last week in his home state of Maryland. Dotson, 21, remains jailed without bond, awaiting extradition to Texas.

Investigators recovered a 9mm pistol, shell casings and what appeared to be Dennehy's shoes near his body.

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Blazer Critic Negotiates to Sideline Boycott Threat

Team president pledges new commitment to diversity

The Trail Blazers narrowly avoided a boycott and backlash of negative publicity when President Steve Patterson met with Blazers' critic R.C. Burke to address accusations of racial exclusion.

Controversy sparked when the Blazers hired John Nash as the team's sixth general manager, overlooking a list of African-American candidates, including ex-Blazer Maurice Lucas.

Burke began his crusade for diweeks with an Internet petition studded with signatures of former professional athletes, actors and African-American leaders.

"I get 1,500 emails a day, many from season ticket holders," said


Burke said he does not have a specific demand or timeline to hold Patterson to his word.


"You can't change 10 years of exclusion overnight," Burke said. "As long as I got people talking and thinking, I've got to give the man a chance."

In a conversation with Nash, Patterson even called the Blazers organization "too white," but said that it reflected the Portland community at large, according to a Blazers spokesperson.

"The Blazers are 100 percent committed to hiring a diverse workforce," said Mike Hanson, communications director for the Blazers. "We believe our hiring practices mirror the demographics of the city of Portland and are reflective of the community at large. In fact, more than half the Trail Blazers management team is made up of women and minorities."

selected by a Citizens Advisory Committee.

Of the grants awarded in June, the PDC received a clean-up grant for \$200,000 for the Grant Warehouse site at 3368 N.E. Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd.

The property, owned by Erwin lien against it, in favor of the Environmental Protection Agency.

For the past 20 years, the property was used to recover precious metals from liquids, ore and process waste and may have been used to extract lead from batteries. The EPA determined that the property posed an imminent threat to human health and the environment. Sample of dust and air col-

lected at the site and blood samples from a homeless encampment occupying the building tested positive for high concentrations of heavy metals and lead.
