## **Cedric Goes Undercover**

Cedric The Entertainer stars as a hard charging private investigator Gus Petch, in Intolerable Cruelty produced by Universal Pictures and opening in theaters nationwide on Friday, Oct. 10.

A mix of Beverly Hills high glamour and maliciously competitive fun, it brings together a cast of unusual pedigree, including George Clooney, Academy Award winner Catherine Zeta-Jones, Oscar winner Geoffrey Rush, Edward Hermann, Richard Jenkins and Oscar winner Billy Bob Thornton.

The picture is the story of a prominent Los Angeles divorce attorney Miles Massey (Clooney) who has reached a career plateau and begins to look for new challenges. He finds his greatest challenge when he meets the much-divorced Marilyn Rexroth (Zeta-Jones), a hard-headed woman pursuing financial independence through serial matrimony. 

Initially when the charge of a racially-motivated killing was proposed, the killer denied it. It was a street brawl, plain and simple. But the prosecutor insisted and finally a plea-bargain deal was reached. Gradually a street brawl was converted by the public mind into a hunting party and its prey. Attempts to correct this myth were met with disbelief.

Once the racial motivation became official doctrine, the path was open to reach out for national leaders of the neo-Nazi movement. The impact on Metzger was severe at first, but was insignificant over the longer term. After meetings with Metzger, Langer concludes that he is probably not significantly worse off(or less influential) today than if he had never been charged.

More important, Langer feels that Portland and Oregon were let off the hook.

Eager as you might be to dig into your next landscape project, a word of caution: play it safe. Here are some outdoor safety tips to keep in mind this fall.

- Call before you dig. A shovel hitting an underground power line can be very dangerous. Call your utility locating service at least 48 hours before you start a job that requires digging. Call us at 1-888-221-7070 and we'll give you the number of the free utility line locating service in your area.
- Follow the 10 foot rule. Look up before you go up and keep yourself and anything you are in contact with at least 10 feet away from overhead power lines.
- Use electric power tools only in dry weather.
- Never touch a downed line or anything it's touching. If you see a downed line, call us immediately and we'll take care of it. Or call 911.
