



Singer's Friend **Attacked in Paris**

(AP) - R&B star Blu Cantrell says she's in "complete shock" after witnessing her friend's stabbing outside a Paris nightclub where she was celebrating her latest album release.

Cantrell and party host Tony Dinero were leaving Le Cabaret Milliardaire on Oct. 16 when a disgruntled club employee attacked them, the singer said in a statement. Cantrell was unharmed, but Dinero suffered stab wounds to the back of his head and eye. Dinero was hospi-

talized after the incident, the statement said, without elaborat-

"I am in complete shock by what happened," Cantrell said in the statement, released by her publicist Wednesday. "I cannot believe that anything like this can happen, especially in a city like this.'

(AP) - Broadway has found its new "Aida" to replace Toni Braxton - Michelle Williams of Destiny's Child. She will join the cast of the long-running Disney musical Nov. 18. Braxton departs Nov. 16 after a four-month run.

"Aida is a woman with such strength," Williams said Tuesday in a statement. "I love this character and can't wait to truly find her within myself."

The 23-year-old Williams joined Destiny's Child in 2000, singing with them on the group's third album, the bestselling "Survivor." The singer's solo de-





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Fred 'Rerun' Berry Dies at Age 52

(AP) - Fred Berry, the squeaky-voiced actor famous for playing red-beret-wearing Rerun on the 1970s TV sitcom "What's Happening!", has died at age 52.

Berry died Oct. 21 at his home in Los Angeles apparently of natural causes. Friends said Berry had been ill because of a recent stroke.

He wore his red beret and suspenders in real life, and it was unclear whether he originally brought his own style to the character of Rerun or whether he was forever mimicking the goofball character that made him famous.

The name Rerun, according to Berry, referred to the character's brainlessness: In the summer, he had to rerun all the classes he failed during the school year.

Among the more famous episodes was one in which Rerun joined a bizarre cult and another in which he was busted for making bootlegged tapes of a Doobie Brothers concert.

Berry's success on the show was clouded by his heavy use of marijuana and cocaine. "There were dealers right there in the studio, people that worked there," he said in 1996.

By the time "What's Happening!" ended, Berry said he had blown more than a million dollars on drugs, cars, homes and an airplane.
