Gallery Hours are Thursday and Friday from 1-6 p.m.; Saturday 11-5; Sunday 1-4 p.m.


## **Plus-sized Painter**


Portland is getting a peek into the world of elephant art as an Oregon Zoo pachyderm creates colorful masterpieces.

Rama, the resident elephant artist at the zoo, has a full collection of works ready for exhibition at the Pearl District's Mark Woolley Gallery May 22 through 24.

The 21-year-old male Asian elephant, isn't the first painting pachyderm. Elephants in Asia have gone to painting school, but Rama appears to be a natural. He is the world's first elephant to combine artistic methods, creating paintings that are reminiscent of Pollock's paint splatters and Miro's subconscious imagery.

Rama's artistic technique involves collecting non-toxic paint in his trunk, and spraying it across a canvas creating colorful backdrops. He then uses a brush to add graceful Rama, the artistic elephant strokes
