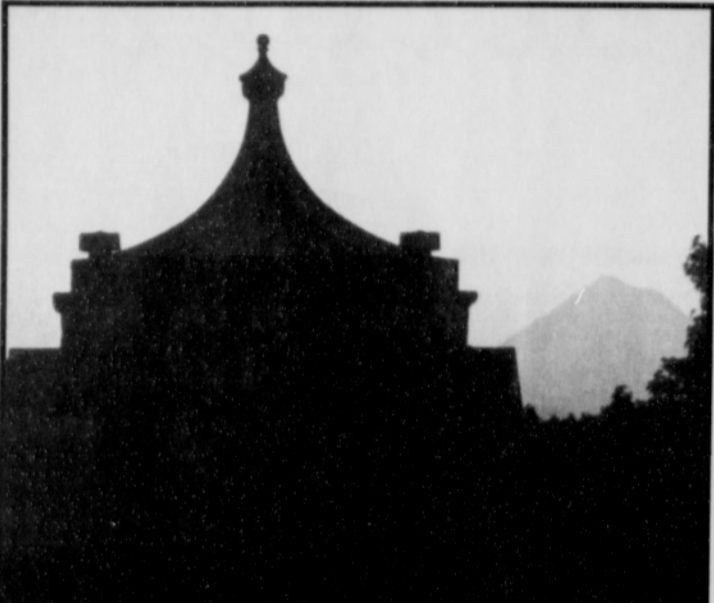

a wound to his upper left thigh and Jason Gauza, a 26-year-old shot in his right ankle.

No suspects have been identified but police are looking for the two men described as persons of interest. One is described as a white male, 21 to 25 years old, 6 feet tall with short brown hair and wearing a tan football type jersey and jeans and a black male with braided hair wearing a white t-shirt.

Anyone who attended the party but did not leave their name with officers at the scene is asked to call Detective Paul Dolbey at 503-823-0576.

A building used as a private dance hall at Northeast San Rafael and Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard is the site of a shooting spree that injured five people.

to hold.

Once completed, 70 men and women will be able to build a new life each day in LifeChange as long-term residents. By teaching them

valuable life skills, such as how to sell themselves properly in the job market and helping them to gain an education as they live and work at the mission, they are given the chance to once again regain independence.

"We want to see these people regain their confidence and be readily equipped to once more re-join mainstream society, but first we need help," Russell said.

Officer Killed in Line of Duty

Clark County Sheriff's Sergeant Brad Crawford was killed Friday when a man involved in a domestic dispute got behind the wheel of a vehicle and crashed into his patrol car.

Robin Schreiber, 43, is charged with murder and vehicle homicide. A public memorial service for the

officer will be held on Thursday, Aug. 6 at 3 p.m. at New Hope Community Church, 11731 S.E. Stephens Rd. in Clackamas.

Vancouver Robber Shot

Vancouver police shot a bank robbery suspect Tuesday after the man took someone hostage.

Police spokesperson Kim Kapp said the hostage was not hurt. Paramedics said the bank robber sustained life-threatening injuries and was transported to Southwest Washington Medical Center. The robbery happened around 9:30 a.m. at Sterling Savings Bank Cascade Park at 14610 S.E. Mill Plain Blvd.

Police caught up with the man near 160th and Mill Plain after he tried running from authorities.

Deadly Max Train Accident

(AP) — A light-rail passenger train struck and killed a man in a wheelchair in southeast Portland Sunday.

One witness told authorities the

incident looked like "unskillful operation of the wheelchair."

Tri-Met officials do not believe the Max train operator was at fault.
