

low educational attainment and speech (including the use of the "n" word) with some of today's black youth. He has also railed against the elevation of blacks that commit crimes and go to prison to the status of celebrity political prisoners. Moreover, he objects to the violence of embittered black men against their female partners.

Cosby believes these and other black shortcomings are sadly indicative of a lack of appreciation for the sacrifices of the civil rights movement.


