'Ray,' 'Hotel Rwanda' Foxx's dead-on receive recognition

It was the best year ever for black performers, who had five of 20 Oscar nominations announced Tuesday.

Jamie Foxx scored two nominations - as best actor for the title role in "Ray" and supporting actor as a taxi driver whose cab is hijacked by a hit man in "Collateral." Foxx's dead-on emulation of Ray Charles has made him the frontrunner in the lead-actor category. The film was doling out two acting nominations. Don also nominated for best picture.


