



Investment Volunteers rebuild in Jefferson

a field of dreams for some of the renovations.

Help is pouring in to rebuild a field of dreams on the Jefferson High School campus in north Portland.

Dozens of community residents, including police officers, coaches, players and neighborhood representatives are renovating the high school's baseball field after years of neglect.

The Portland Police Association became interested when they learned that Jefferson hasn't fielded a team for three years.

African American police officer Daryl Turner and other members of the association went to their union board and won a \$2,5000 donation that is being used to pay

Members of the non-profit Youth Gang Outreach team and Humboldt Neighborhood Association have also added a donation of sweat-equity by working on the project. A local business has offered to donate bats needed for the team to practice. The school is also seeking the donation of additional baseball equipment and a riding lawnmower to maintain the field.

The goal is to have a working baseball field by April 6 ahead of Jefferson's opening game on April 19.
