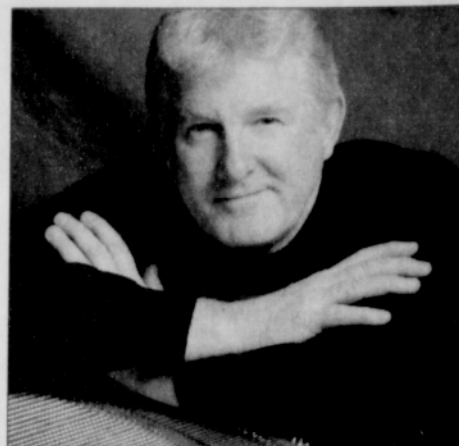
As former musical director

had two children, Felita Yvette Tyler and Ordway Tyler II.

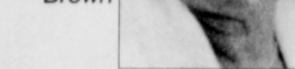

The Oct. 14 event will begin with a luncheon and address by Dr. Gibbs, followed by two workshops and a closing dialogue panel discussion, which offer the opportunity to earn continuing education units.

The first workshop, titled "Health disparities: What can We Do?" will be conducted by McKeever and Dr. Gibbs. Dr. Rosa Colquitt and Fred Miller of the Oregon Health & Science University will conduct the second workshop, "Equitable Culturally Competent Health Care Services." Then conference will close with a panel discussion, "How can we make a difference?" to create a community-wide vi-

sion and commitment to eliminate racial health disparities.

The conference is a unique educational opportunity in the state of Oregon and will add direct value to the practices of physicians and other health professionals. Interested participants may earn up to 4.5 continuing education units, issued by the OHSU School of Nursing Continuing Education Program. Physicians and physician assistants may self-claim Category II continuing education units.

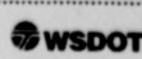
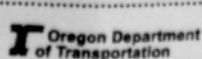
