## **Local Man Claims \$2.6 Million Lottery**

## Winning family in state of disbelief

Samuel Howard of Portland is the Oregon Lottery's 199th Megabucks millionaire, after claiming his \$2.6 million prize from the Oct. 19, Megabucks drawing.

Howard, accompanied by his wife, Elizabeth, and niece, Lovey, received his prize at the Lottery Office in Salem, on Thursday

Howard chose the Investment Fund for prize payment, which gives the winner one-half of the advertised jackpot amount in a single, one-time payment. His prize was valued at \$1.3 million, before state and federal taxes were withheld.

Howard and his family were in a state of disbelief when they arrived at the Lottery office. "I just can't believe it," said Elizabeth. "I can't stop thinking about more than \$2 million, and I can't believe it ours."

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Howard purchased a single Quick Pick

ticket at 205 Liquor on East Burnside Street. His winning ticket, one of 10,813 winning tickets from the Oct. 19, drawing, was for \$1, and had two sets of numbers. Howard won his big prize with the second set of

Howard is the Oregon Lottery's 199<sup>th</sup> Megabucks millionaire. Howard said he was ready to head to the bank and deposit his prize money after receiving his oversized commemorative prize check, and posing for complimentary winners' pho-


tos with his family.

"I still can't believe it," said Howard, "But it's getting easier."

Overall, Oregon Lottery Megabucks players have won more than \$577 in prizes.
