## Portland's Jazz **History Shared**

Author, historian introduces 'Jumptown'

Combining music, politics, and social history, the new book "Jumptown: The Golden Years of Portland Jazz, 1942-1957" sheds light on a time and place overlooked by histories of Portland and jazz.

In mid-twentieth century Portland, a thriving African-American neighborhood-that would soon be bulldozed for urban renewal-spawned a jazz heyday rarely rivaled on the West Coast.


Such luminaries as Duke Ellington, Charlie Parker, Oscar Peterson, and Dave Brubeck headlined Portland clubs and traded chops with the up-andcoming local talent.
