Doris 'Granny D' Haddock

96-year-old Activist to Visit

Granny D, an activist who has walked thousands of miles in her 90s to raise attention to political causes, will pay a visit to the University of Portland

Doris "Granny D" Haddock will speak to students at 10 a.m. Friday, March 10 in Mago Hunt Theater on campus, 5000 N. Willamette Blvd. Her talk is free and open to the public.

Born in 1910 in Laconia, N.H., Haddock attended Emerson College, worked and raised her family during the Great Depression, and later worked in a shoe factory in Manchester for 20 years.

With her husband James, she helped stop the planned use of hydrogen bombs in Alaska in 1960, saving an Inuit fishing village at Point Hope. She nursed her husband through 10 years of Alzheimer's disease.

In January 1999, at the age of 89, she began a walk across the country to demonstrate her concern for campaign reform. She walked more than 1,000 miles through deserts and climbed the Appalachian range in blizzard conditions.

In 2003 and 2004, she embarked on a 23,000 mile tour of the "swing states," encouraging women and the residents of poor neighbor- she was the official Democratic You're Never Too Old to Raise a hoods to register to vote.
