good place to do business. Mixed Use

PDC will promote commercial. mixed-use development on the street like the Fremont and Heritage commercial projects, the Vanport Project nearing ground breaking, and possibly expanding MLK's Oregon Convention Center Urban Renewal District to include sites past the intersections of Northeast Alberta and Killingsworth Streets. Another strategy is to promote business land ownership either through the condominium model being used at Vanport or a commercial land trust.

#### More Housing

PDC will support additional housing on PDC land sites, including the Grant Warehouse and Beech properties, and create "permit-ready" models and zone changes that would make properties more suitable for housing developers.

#### **Transit**, Parking

Improve the function of MLK Boulevard for pedestrians and transit. This would include a study to improve design of the boulevard, and especially ways to increase the parking supply.


The total cost of the updated strategy is about \$9 million over and above funds already committed. The urban renewal district is set to expire in 2013 and has about \$30 million left to spend.

PDC staffer Estee Segal said that the avenue has seen a lot of development at its north and south ends, but PDC is concerned about a lack of progress near Northeast Fremont to Alberta streets.

Richard Levy, a member of urban renewal committee, said the refocus attempt has a lot of practical applications.

'It's a good step in the right direction," he said.


