Portland Boxing Legend Dies at 63

Halim Rahsaan, formerly known as William Earl Cross, was born on May 12, 1943 to the Union of William Cross and Harrie Belle Thurman Cross Paris. Rahsaan passed away on July 7,

Rahsaan's primary education began at Elliott Elementary School, continued at Benson Polytechnic High School, and he graduated from Jefferson High School in 1961. Immediately following high school, he enlisted in the U.S. Army. Following his honorable discharge, Rahsaan attended Southern Illinois University and Lewis and Clark College, where he received

Rahsaan boxed out of the Knott Street Community Center, where his team won three national titles, and in 2005 the boxing team was inducted into the Oregon Sports Hall of Fame.

Rahsaan was involved in many community organizations, a few of which were Black United Front, Coalition of Black Men, CMac, the TriMet Rider Advocates, Crisis Team and the Youth Gang Outreach Program.

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


