"We're hoping to shed more light on the complexities of domestic violence, and how community members can help create safety and accountability," said Terrie Quinteros, program director of the crime survivors group and the play's writer and director.

"We know that not everyone feels comfortable calling the police. By engaging the audience in finding community based solutions, we show that each one of us can take a role in creating safety and accountability," Quinteros said.
