



Bob Marley Coin Hit Streets

(AP) -- Bob Marley's records long ago went platinum. Now the Bank of Jamaica is releasing commemorative coins in gold and silver with the late reggae superstar's dreadlocked likeness.

The 1,000 coins, producedby the British Royal Mint, are being sold for \$100 each.

Though the coins were intended to mark the 60th anniversary of Marley's birth, which was celebrated in 2005, the bank is just now offering them for sale.

It is the second time the Bank of Jamaica has issued coins bearing Marley's likeness.

Born in Jamaica's rural St. Ann made him an icon in developing parish, Marley rose from the gritty shantytowns of Kingston to global stardom in the 1970s with hits such Miami at age 36 in 1981, remains one as "No Woman No Cry" and "I Shot of Jamaica's most beloved national the Sheriff." 
