Police Custody Death Investigated

Family can't find justification for force used

(AP) — Mayor Tom Potter called for and Police Chief Rosie Sizer promised a speedy investigation into the death of James Chasse Jr., a mentally ill man who died in police custody last

At a news conference Monday, Sizer said investigators would soon release a timeline and statements from officers and witnesses. Sizer said she expects the Multnomah County district attorney to send the investigation to a grand jury.

Potter, who is out of town visiting family, issued a statement calling for an investigation. that is fast and transparent.

Also this week, Tom Steenson, an attorney for the Chasse family, said the family's independent investigation has yet to find any justification for the amount of force that police used Chief Rosie Sizer on Chasse.

year-old man appeared to be on drugs or have a mental disorder, and one officer thought Chasse may have been urinating in the street, police said.

Chasse ran when the police arrived and a chase ensued. Witnesses said officers knocked Chasse to the pavement. They said officers then landed on top of him, Officers spotted Chasse on a Pearl kicked him and placed a Taser gun to

After arresting him, officers called for paramedics because Chasse was having trouble breathing. Police said the paramedics cleared him to go to jail, so they took him to be booked on accusations of resisting arrest and assaulting a police officer. Nurses at the jail said Chasse needed medical care, and police were called to take him to the hospital. Chasse died in a

State medical examiner Dr. Karen Gunson said Friday that Chasse died of blunt force trauma to the chest and called the manner of death accidental.

Steenson said Chasse's death was no accident. He said police had no

reason to knock Chasse to the pavement, kick him, hogtie him and then use a Taser.

Chasse's father, James Chasse Sr., said his son was diagnosed as schizophrenic and anyone who spoke to him would have realized he was severely

In her news conference Monday, Chief Sizer described the county's mental health system as being in a state of breakdown.

Potter also raised the issue. "This is not an issue just for Portland police, but rather one that calls for a solution that includes our correctional system, medical and mental health providers," he said in his statement.

Clinton Cites Fox 'Hit Job'

During TV interview

(AP) -- In a combative interview on "Fox News Sunday," former President Clinton defended his handling of the threat posed by Osama bin Laden, saying he tried to have bin Laden killed and was attacked for his efforts by the same people who now criticize him for not doing enough.

"That's the difference in me and some, including all of the right-wingers who are attacking trying. They had eight months to Wallace of a "conservative hit me now," Clinton said in the interview. "They ridiculed me for

job" and asked: "I want to know how many people in the Bush administration you asked, 'Why didn't you do anything about the Cole?' I want to know how many people you asked, 'Why did you fire Dick Clarke?"

He was referring to the USS Cole, attacked by terrorists in Yemen in 2000, and former White House anti-terrorism chief Richard A. Clarke.

Wallace said Sunday he was surprised by Clinton's "conspiratorial view" of "a very non-confrontational question, 'Did you do enough to connect the dots and go after Al Qaida?"

"All I did was ask him a question, and I think it was a legitimate news question. I was surprised that he would conjure up that this was a hit job," Wallace said in a telephone interview

Clinton said he "worked hard" to try to kill bin Laden.

"We contracted with people to kill him. I got closer to killing him than anybody's gotten since,"

He told Wallace, "And you got that little smirk on your face and you think you're so clever, but I had responsibility for trying to protect this country. I tried and I failed to get bin Laden. I regret it, but I did try and I did everything I thought I responsibly could."
