



(AP) -- T.I. will have a chance to show why he calls himself "The King."

The Atlanta-based rapper received eight nominations for the BET Hip-Hop Awards, which will air nationally on the cable channel on Wednesday, Nov. 15. Busta Rhymes drew the second-most nominations, six; Chamillionaire got five, while Yung Joc and Lupe Fiasco got four apiece.

Stephen Hill, executive vice president of entertainment, music and talent at BET, expressed enthusiasm for the decision to hold the event in Atlanta.


"Hip-hop is huge here," Hill said. "This city has an energy that you can touch. This is the home plate for southern hip-hop and music in general."




