Despite naysayers' doubts, the 36-year-old Jay-Zthought he was retired from music-making: "Ibelieved it, yeah. I believed it for two vears."

Comedian Erupts in Racial Rage

Michael Richards, the actor who played "Kramer" in the TV comedy "Seinfield," stunned a comedy club audience, shouting racial epithets at people who heckled him during a stand-up rou-

The 57-year-old actor-comedian was performing at the Laugh Factory in West Hollywood Friday night when he launched into the verbal rampage, according to video posted on TMZ.com.

The tirade apparently began after two black audience members started shouting at him that he wasn't funny.

Richards retorted: "Shut up! Fifty years ago we'd have you upside down with a f----- fork up your a--."

He then paced across the stage taunting the men for interrupting his show, peppering his speech with racial slurs and profanities.

"You can talk, you can talk, you're brave now mother-----. Throw his a -- out. He's a n----!" Richards shouts before repeating the racial epithet over and over again.

While there is some audible chuckling in the audience

throughout the outburst, someone can be heard gasping "Oh my God" and various people "Ooh" after Richard uses the n-word.

Richards refused to comment on-camera when reached by CNN, but the network reported that he said off-camera he felt sorry for what had happened and had made amends.
