

David Fidanque is executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union of Oregon. Fidanque said that because it is so easy to get initiatives on our state ballots, the ACLU has had extensive experience in fighting the interests of wealthy, out of state individuals, including a key player in the American Civil Rights Coalition chairman, Ward Connerly of Sacramento.

"The caution I'd give to Mr. Connerly is to think twice about coming to Oregon," Fidanque said. "Folks who put up big money for initiatives in this past cycle didn't do well, and I'm confident there'd

be a strong and broad coalition to oppose the type of initiative he has proposed elsewhere."

Fidanque is referring to recently defeated ballot measures that would impose term limits on state legislatures, limit state spending and require parental notification for teenage abortions.

"We haven't won them all," Fidanque said.

"But on this issue we'd look to the business community to step up, and I think they would because they understand importance of having a well-educated and diverse

When asked about Michigan ballot measure, Fidanque said his ACLU counterparts in that state have not had as much experience fighting out of state initiatives.

There's no question [our experience] puts us in a much stronger position to fend off this kind of attack of policy," he said.

"The clear result of measures in other states has been to increase discrimination against those who are most vulnerable in our society. I think the majority of Oregonians understand when you attack one group, you attack the fabric of this

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Firefighters Strong Arm Heckler

Man forced to ground, kicked

(AP)—Firefighters forced a 48year-old Portland man to the ground confrontation captured on surveillance tapes.

The tapes, recorded from cameras placed in the lobby of the Fairfield Apartments in southwest Portland, show a tenant, Terry DeGeorge, arguing with firefighters and paramedics before being

wrestled to the ground. While he was being held down

DeGeorge said he suffered a swollen wrist, a bruised forearm because he was awakened by a and abrasions on his face. "It was animalistic behavior," said and kicked him during a downtown DeGeorge, whose apartment manager provided him with a copy of

The video does not include sound. Lt. Allen Oswalt, a spokesman for the Portland Fire Bureau, said there would be a more complete picture of what happened if he said. "Instead of trying to calm viewers could hear DeGeorge me down by talking to me, they scream profanities.

"He was being very aggressive, by two firefighters and a paramedic, in your face kind of stuff," Oswalt will file a complaint.
