


Black History Month Attractions

Facets of Africa -- The Interstate Firehouse Cultural Center, 5340 N. Interstate Ave., presents a host of celebrations for 'Black History' month including vibrant storytelling of African culture, the stunning images of 'Tribal Women' and colorful paintings of Maasai warriors.



Confrontation at the Bridge -- An original silkscreen print by noted African American artist Jacob Lawrence will be on view at Reed College through Wednesday, Feb. 15. The print depicts the 1965 civil rights march from Selma to Montgomery, Ala. when protesters were met with brutal resistance on the Edmund Pettus Bridge. 



Life, Culture through Music -- Nordstom's presents photos by Kamoinge, a New York-based


group of photographers, at its Lloyd Center store throughout the month to celebrate Black History Month. The exhibit illustrates black life and culture through music over the past 40 years.
