

(AP) -- Oscar winners Forest Whitaker and Jennifer Hudson kept their winning streaks alive Friday, while "Grey's Anatomy" star Isaiah Washington claimed a best actor prize at the 38th annual NAACP Image Awards. "Ugly Betty" took top television honors.

Hudson, a former "American Idol" finalist, garnered a best supporting actress award for her role in the musical "Dreamgirls," the same category she won at the Academy Awards on Sunday.

Whitaker, who won a best actor Oscar for "The Last King of Scot-Friday's ceremony, which honor projects and individuals who promote diversity in the arts.

A culturally diverse company that crystallizes the raw energy of urban performers while maintaining the polished delivery of seasoned artists comes to the Interstate Firehouse Cultural Center, 5340 N.
