

Boyfriend Guilty of Murder

A Portland man who was so angry over a breakup that he stabbed his former girlfriend is guilty of murder.

A Multnomah County jury Monday rejected defense arguments that Gilberto Pedroso was reasonably distressed and only guilty of manslaughter when he stabbed Claudia Rhone 17 times on the lawn of her north Portland apartment complex last May 2.

Defense attorney Joe Calhoun argued that Pedroso was affected by an "extreme emotional disturbance." For months, he was so obsessed with Rhone that he kept watch on her unit at 216 N. Sumner St. -- even sleeping under her window, Calhoun said.

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
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
