

Gay Rights Bill Advances

The measure passed 21-7 despite criticism from some Republicans, who said there is no widespread and serious discrimination against gays and lesbians.



That means gays and lesbians could not be fired from jobs, evicted from apartments or denied access to public places because of their sexual orientation. Churches and Backers said, however, that other religious institutions would be exempted.
