

Earthquake Spurs Nuclear Leak

Raises questions about safety

Japanese authorities Tuesday suspended the operation of a nuclear power plant after a radiation leak and other damage from a deadly earthquake raised new concerns about the safety of Japan's accident-plagued nuclear industry.

Tokyo Electric Power, an electric company that operates the nuclear plant near the city of Kashiwazaki, said it had found more than 50 problems at the plant caused by Monday's 6.6 magnitude earthquake.

While most of the problems were nearby Sea of Japan. minor, the largest included 100 drums drums to open, the company said.


