Art Partnership Creates Lasting Image

Police, youth and others join cause

A mural has brought together an unlikely bunch - police, street youth, an artist, social service agencies and city bureaus, all in an effort to create a lasting image in the heart of downtown Portland.

The scene depicts "people of all types and walks of life, coming together around a bonfire," explains William Park, the professional artist who brought the concept to life. "The bonfire represents strength and community," adds Portland Police Officer Betty Woodward who works out of Central Precinct. Both make clear that the concept for the artwork came from the young people who hang out in the area.

This is no ordinary mural, which is located on a wall by the MAX light rail turn around on Southwest11th Avenue between Yamhill and Morrison streets.

When you go by to view the progress of the project you may see several young people working alongside the artist. These young people are often referred to as homeless or street youth, but when they are working on the mural, they are artists.

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


