The developers were resolved to utilize building materials and methods that are more sustainable than those typically used on other tem that utilizes one water heater projects of this sort.

Such features include reclaimed hardwood floors from The ReBuilding Center, reclaimed stair treads and risers from the nowdemolished Whitaker/Adams School, a radiant-floor-heating sys-

for both heat and domestic use, ultra high-efficiency insulation and windows, exposed beam ceilings on the second floor, an air-recirculation system, a minimal building foot print without grass for maximal rainwater permeation and high-efficiency


appliances.

This project is a vivid example of how minority entrepreneurs are active in the neighborhoods of Portland, shaping its future in a very positive way.

By some people's evaluation, Bridgecity Group may be contributing to the gentrification that is commonly characterized as a malevolent market force. The Alemseghed

brothers, however, are not victims of urbanization.

Rather, they are visionaries who bring an innovative and positive influence to city development. They offer a case study in how minorities can take an active role in shaping the growth and future of our fine city, rather than being cast as the helpless throw away victims of capitalistic endeavors.
