to build high-rise apartments on the site. In December, the Portland City Council granted Miracles \$500,000 from the General Fund to enable Miracles to purchase property along MLK. The goal was to help the club transition from renting space to a more secure position of ownership.

"The Miracles Club is a vital resource in our city for individuals and families dealing with drug and alcohol issues," stated City Commissioner Dan Saltzman. "In addition to the Club's work with individuals in recovery, it continues to provide essential services in the reduction of crime in the general area."


In April, the City Council sought the expertise of the PDC and requested the agency's assistance in bringing Miracles into the urban renewal area.

PDC Chair Mark Rosenbaum led the Commission's unanimous approval by saying, "This is a terrific project for an organization that has more than a decade of success in providing prevention and treatment services."
