Mural Forefronts Women's Activism

More than 50 volunteers celebrated the completion last weekend of a mural that is enormous both in size and scope.

The topic of "Women Making History in Portland" could have easily covered much more than the approximately 20 by 70-foot wall that the group was able to secure near the Interstate MAX station at North Mississippi and Albina Avenues.

The challenge of narrowing down such a topic rested on a painstaking process.

Originally sponsored by Killingsworth Street's In Other Words Women's Books and Resources nearly a year ago, the mural became the collaborative effort of at least a dozen metro-area nonprofits. Each organization nominated women from their communities making a significant impact on the city from the grassroots level.

Sisters in Action for Power, the Oregon Council for Hispanic Advancement, the Native American Youth and Family Center, the Black United Fund of Oregon, the Urban League of Portland and the Cambodian-American Community of Oregon are just a few of the organizations that named women to be represented in the mural.

In orchestrating the city's largest mural to date paying tribute to the contributions of female community leaders, Robin Corbo hopes the piece helps raise the general public's awareness about their important contributions. The 26 activists, artists, writers and elected officials shown on the wall used a wide range of techniques to tackle broad sets of issues.

Waves Closes Shop after 31 Years

After 31 years of serving the African American community at 1926 N.E. Sandy Blvd., the Waves Hair Design full-service salon is closing up shop and going in different directions.

With a new owner taking over the building and their lease expiring, owner Janet Warren said it was time for her to downsize. She will continue providing salon services from her home and can be reached at 360-882-8042.

Warren, who has owned Waves for

eight years, said "This is not a sad occasion for me. This is by choice. I want to thank everyone for supporting us and welcoming us into the community."

Waves stylist Matt Garlington and two others are setting up their own new shop, Y.G.'s Salon, at 3140 E. Burnside St. The moves should take place by Nov. 6.

The new Y.G. Salon stands for Yvonne Garlington, Matt's mother. The best known member of the family was the Rev. John Garlington, longtime pastor of Mount Olivet Baptist Church and one of the city's leading community

a- activists.

His father was originally a barber and, Matt recalls, cut his own children's hair when the family lived in Buffalo.

"When I became an adult, I wanted to do something that would allow me to be my own boss," Garlington says. "This was something I knew, so it was the fastest way."

He has been at it for 10 years, specializing in "natural styles – dreadlocks, twists, extensions."

Y.G.'s will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.
