## Hip Hop to a Higher Power

#### Rennie Harris' returning to Portland with 'Puremovement'


White Bird is excited to welcome the long-awaited return of the grand master of hip-hop dance, Rennie Harris, and his 11member company, Rennie Harris Puremovement.

Four performances are scheduled at Portland State University's Lincoln Hall with 8 p.m. performances on Thursday, Dec. 6 through Saturday, Dec. 8 and a special Saturday matinee on Dec. 8 at 2 p.m. Tickets are available at the PSU Box Office and all Ticketmaster outlets.

Harris is the acclaimed choreographer who has taken the hip-hop aesthetic into concert halls and performances spaces, using the vernacular of the street which includes the various techniques of B-boy (break dancing), house dancing, stepping and other styles that have grown organically from the urban inner cities of America.

The Village Voice has said of Harris' unique company, "the message goes beyond the sensational dazzle of head spins and dives, of limbs that twisted so fast their owner seems to be disassembling himself. It encompasses the wish to be identified, and to identify oneself, as an individual, not just a member of a race or a gang.'

Marking the 15th anniversary of Rennie Harris Puremovement, the company will perform a program of groundbreaking work created between 1992 and 2007. This includes Harris' "P-Funk" (1992), focusing on the individuality and group dynamics of Harris's athletic male dancers; "March of the Antmen" (1992), a reflective, politically charged work inspired by the Million Man March on Washington; and "Con-

tinuum" (1997), a dazzling hip-hop dance jam that showcases the breathtaking virtuosity of Harris' company. Especially exciting will be previews of two new worksin-progress: "Breath" for the four women in the company, and a solo performed by Rennie Harris, "Princescarekrows Road to Da Emerald City, excerpted from a new one-man show that Harris is currently working on.

Lorenzo "Rennie" Harris grew up in North Philadelphia, immersed in hip-hop culture. His group's work encompasses the diverse and rich African-American traditions of the past, while simultaneously giving voice to a new generation, offering audiences a sincere view of the essence and spirit of hip hop, rather than the commercially exploited stereotypes portrayed by the media.
