Civil Rights Repeatedly Violated

State hospital has range of ills

(AP) - The U.S. Department of Justice has found numerous civilrights violations of patients at the Oregon State Hospital.

In a report released Jan. 16, federal investigators listed inadequate widespread patient-on-patient as- ties

Federal law entitles patients to certain standards of care.

State health officials say many improvements have been made since the investigation took place the 48-page report include: in 2006, but acknowledged prob-

"The conditions reported ... are year. completely unacceptable," said Dr. Oregon's Department of Human Services. "It's unacceptable as a state and it's unacceptable for us as a state hospital for the health and well-being of our patients."

Infection control issues such as monia and outbreaks of norovirus and scabies.

Patients injuring themselves, while under staff observation.

Failure to follow common standards of care: A patient with a disorder that causes excessive thirst was left at the water fountain and gained 13 pounds in water weight in one day.

Patients being put in seclusion indefinitely: One patient had been in seclusion for a year with no other treatment when investigators ar-

against-patient assault over one medication, failure to diagnose mental health conditions, improper use of restraints, nurses working Bruce Goldberg, director of mice in rooms, deaths from pneu- excessive overtime and patients waiting for discharge for more than a year after being approved.

The report sets out recomincluding multiple suicide attempts, mended changes but does not set timelines to complete them. It is the latest in a series of critical looks at the hospital. Multiple state-commissioned reports found major health and safety dangers there, primarily from the crumbling century-old facility in Salem.



Officer who Killed Unarmed Motorist Hired

For police work in Beaverton

(AP) — A former police officer who fatally shot an unarmed African-American motorist in the St. John's neighborhood of north Portland has been hired by the Beaverton Police Department.

Jason Sery, 32, shot James Jahar Perez three times during a traffic stop in 2004. Sery claimed he saw Perez pull a clenched fist from his right pocket, thinking he was pulling out a gun. A second officer, Sean Macomber, then fired his Taser gun at Perez.

'Pastor' Sentenced to Prison for Fraud

Victims taken in real-estate scams

(AP) — A man from Gresham and Sandy who called himself "Pastor Corey" to gain the trust of victims in a real-estate scam was sentenced last week to almost eight years in prison.

Corey J. Pritchett, 44, would use clients' money to remodel and sell houses, promising 30 percent returns. Or he sold or rented homes that he didn't own or manage. He once sold two separate people the same house on the same day.

In all, Pritchett was convicted of 32 counts tied to scamming victims out of an estimated \$43,000 from 2004 to 2006. Prosecutors said he cheated many more victims than the nine cases he was charged with.


Pritchett will also appear later this month in Clackamas County Circuit Court, where he faces 25 more charges of defrauding people.
