Free College Course


For low-oncome Portland-area adults

Oregon Council for the Humanities, in partnership with Reed College, offers eighth year of free college-level humanities course.

Humanity in Perspective (HIP), a free, two-semester, college-level course in the humanities for low-income adults in Portland offered by the Oregon Council for the Humanities (OCH) and Reed College, is currently accepting applications for the 2008-09 year until Friday, July 25,

Applications are available for download on the OCH website (www.oregonhum.org http://www.oregonhum.org/">) or by request from Sarah Van Winkle, OCH Program Coordinator, at (503) 241-0543.

Applicants must be 18 years of age or older, able to speak and write fluently in English, and willing to commit to attending class two evenings per week during the seven-month program. Applicants should not already have a bachelor's degree and are not required to have a high school diploma or GED.





in refugee camps with no formal schooling before coming to Oregon," said keys Jama of the Center for Intercultural Organizing.


Similar measures passed in other states have been shown to hinder the ability of children to learn English. In California, a recent study revealed that, six years after an anti-bilingual education measure's passage, just one-quarter of a Hispanic pupils could expect to be reclassified as fluent in English.

Last year, there were 62,084 students enrolled in English language development programs in Oregon school districts.
