tion, published the original book as part of a series to combat historical accounts at the time which failed to recognize the achievements of minority groups.

DuBois' book highlights the role of blacks at crucial points in history from the beginning.

A black man named Estevanico was the first Euro-New Mexico after others on the expedition died. A black man accompanied Lewis and Clark, while Commodore Peary, who discovered the North Pole, time maintained records for Attucks, a runaway slave, as praised the work of his black assistant, Matthew Henson.

"Dramatically, the Negro is the central thread of American history," DuBois wrote. "The whole story turns on him whether we think of the dark and flying slave ship in the sixteenth century, the expanding plantations of the seventeenth, the swelling commerce of the eighteenth or the fight for free-
