## Black History in the Making

## A witness to President Obama's historic inauguration

No matter where you were or what you were doing on Jan. 20, 2009, you became apart of history when Barack Hussein Obama, a black man became

the 44th President of the United States of America.

Nearly one month ago today, I stood in 28 degree weather with a wind chill that made it feel like 18 degrees, but I was not cold, the voices inside of me were warming my body and my heart.

This was the presence of history being recorded and there was nothing I could say that hadn't already been said -

Looking almost a year ago, to when I first watched news footage of this handsome, bright, articulate, for-

midable black man announce his candidacy for President of the United States, my mind raced back to the three other black Americans that had taken up this challenge in my life time-Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm, Rev. Jesse Jackson and Rev. Al




