## **County Report: Substandard Housing Growing Problem**

A report recently released by the Multnomah County Health Department states that substandard housing in the area is contributing to health problems of tenants. Deteriorating housing contributes to ailments such as asthma, heart disease, and unintentional

The report attributes the growing problem to the lack of quality affordable housing in the area. It also blames the soaring housing prices and the city's tight control of growth as contributing to the issue. Low-income people are particularly impacted.

Mold growth, lead poisoning from paint chips, and pests were cited as common problems.

"Maintenance coupled with education for renters and landlords is critical to healthy housing," said Lisa Wickham, manager of Multnomah County Health department's Environmental Services, in a statement.

The Multnomah County Health Department convened a summit in 2007 to address the issue. It recommended an overhaul of the city housing code, using incentives to steer market forces toward creating affordable housing, educating landlords and tenants about their rights and obligations, and creating coalitions between developers and community organizations to address the issue, among others. The report also stated that more people are renting because of problems in the mortgage industry.
